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Lots of Wind + Rain + Old Trees = a BIG mess on Ramblewood last month!

With a rainfall of 6-7 inches, a large tree came down and with it, breaking a water pipe. Water was gushing out at an enormous rate causing a mudslide and a possible sink hole on Ramblewood. Aqua came out quickly to repair the leak temporarily until DOT could properly replace the pipe. Unfortunately to stop the gushing, they had to turn off our water for 24 hours. The break was along the main line that fed both sides of Rambling Ridge. Just this past week, DOT replaced the broken 16" pipe with a 24" pipe, fixed the drain and stabilized the road.

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### **Emergency Water Strategies to Consider**

In uncertain times it is always good to have a little bit extra of all the things you might need. Food, medications, hygiene products. An extra can or bottle of this or that is never a bad idea, in fact, make that two. As anyone who lives on the Ridge knows, the rule of 'extras' certainly applies to water. Our water system here on the Ridge is, at best, problematic and a frequent challenge to many if not all of us. I'm sure that anyone who has lived on the Ridge for even a short period of time knows to keep a healthy supply of bottled water on hand. But what about those other aguatic needs? Humans are mammals and that food and drink we so enjoy produces bodily wastes. It doesn't take long for that waste in the commode to become annoying. A couple of buckets of flush water, drawn from a rainwater tank can solve the waste disposal challenge very quickly. What about that other mammalian problem that causes us to turn up our noses when we get too close to each other after several days without a bath or shower? There are a number of solutions to this. Outdoor stores often carry portable showers used by campers. However, a clever, inexpensive solution involves the use of garden sprayers filled with several gallons of water heated on your stove (if you still have electricity) or your propane camping stove if you don't. Pressurize the tank and spray yourself in your home shower. Several safety tips are also worth considering, make sure you've not used that shower sprayer for anything else, like weed or insect killer. Also, make sure the rain barrel is not full during the winter months, it may freeze and crack. And make sure that tank is fully covered. We don't want to add the irritating bite of mosquitoes to that problematic water system.

Finally, whatever the concern, those of us who are caring for friends and family with special needs must make sure those needs are provided for, first.

"Ivy" is a 50 gallon rain barrel designed to collect roof runoff water to reuse it for your lawn, plants and emergency (non-drinking) water for flushing toilets during an outage. It is estimated a rain barrel can save 1300 gallons a year, which saves money on your water bill!

- ☐ Prune crepe myrtles, butterfly bush, lantana, nandina and summer blooming bushes.
- ☐ Apply pre-emergence herbicides for crabgrass
- ☐ Tune up lawn mowers, sharpen blades and changing oil
- ☐ Buy your bulbs while they are less expensive and plant when at least 55 degrees
- ☐ Cut back ornamental grasses

### What types of items can be tracked?

-removal of flammable materials under deck/porch
-removal of debris and leaves in gutters
-inspection of roof & shingles as needed
-chimney inspection/spark arrestor installation
-removal of fallen limbs (yes, chipper day counts!)

-trimming tree limbs near house
-raking/removal of pine needles & leaves
-clearing of vegetation around propane tanks
You get the idea! If you are spending time doing things to help reduce fire ignition, keep track of your hours and email it in!

Most piles aren't as neat or small as this one but keeping the cut ends to the front of the pile helps the crew pick up more easily.

#### **CHIPPER DAY GUIDELINES**

- Brush piles can be no larger than what you can put in the back of a pickup truck (roughly 8 feet long by 6 feet wide). The crews will not take anything larger\*
- Brush will need to be out by the side of the road in a neat pile but not in the way of traffic or plows. Ends facing out helps the crew pick up easily.
  - Brush and branches can be no larger than 6" in diameter.

Absolutely NO construction debris, vines, finished lumber, bamboo, stumps, potted plants, flower bushes or stems/plants with thorns. This is for the protection of the workers as well as the equipment.

\*If you have a substantial amount of brush you can contract separately with the company we will be using. Let us know in advance!

Our RR Firewise volunteers will drive through the neighborhood and spray paint a mark on the piles to indicate to the chipper crew who is paid.

Thank you for helping out in this important event to keep our neighborhood clean and safe!


### Do you have a favorite restaurant? Posteros, Falls Landing or the Pisgah Inn.
